Superintendent's Message

We will soon come to the end of another incredible (and incredibly busy) school year here at Greene Central School. I am so proud to be able to serve the wonderful students, teachers, faculty, staff, parents, and community members. Thank you for all you do to make coming to work here such a pleasure.

Academically, we believe this to be another stellar year. We await the results of our external examinations such as the 3-8 Math and English Language Arts state tests. In the high school, we will soon begin the Regents exams and final exams to conclude the 2016-2017 school year. I want to take this opportunity to thank our students, the Greene Central School faculty and staff, and our families for all the excellent work in achieving an incredibly successful year.

We look forward to our summer work which will be to prepare for the exciting launch of the 2017-2018 school year in September. This preparation includes the finalization of technology plans and curriculum to update and/or replace current technology through the New York State SMARTBOND program. This program set aside 1.4 million dollars for technology, safety and security, and other technology infrastructure at Greene Central School. Schools across the state of New York must submit these comprehensive technology plans to receive their allotted funding sources.

It is our intention to develop the SMARTBOND plan collaboratively and begin to undertake the process. We expect that parts of this technology plan will take nine months to a year to reach final state approval, while a few items must be secured this summer. These items will need to be purchased by the district and we will be reimbursed once New York State gives the final approval to our submitted proposals.

Soon we will have given our graduation speeches and offered our congratulations with wishes for a lifetime of success and happiness for our graduates. We wish their dreams to come true, and their pride and commitment in what they do will lead them to excel in their future beyond Greene Central School. We are proud of them, we love them and wish them the very best in the next chapter.

I thank the Board of Education for the opportunity they have given me. I look forward to the 2017-2018 school year with great optimism and excitement.

To the students, faculty and staff of Greene Central School, I express my sincere appreciation and gratitude for your support and efforts on behalf of our students.

Katherine Nicole Anderson, daughter of Mitchell and Christine Anderson, is the Valedictorian of the Class of 2017. Katherine has participated in many sports and extra-curricular activities throughout her high school career. She has been

a member of the Varsity Field Hockey and Track teams for four years and has danced competitively at Step Up and Dance for fifteen years. She has also participated in Rotary International Interact and Student Council throughout all of high school and has been a member of Honor Society for two years. Discovery Night




Don't Let a Tick Make You Sick!

Keep ticks away!

- Wear repellent on your bare skin or wear clothes that have repellent built-in.
- Check for ticks at the end of each day.
- Take a shower too! It will help wash off the ticks you
- Change clothes. Don't put on your old clothes that might have ticks still crawling on them.
- Avoid taking short cuts through thick brush and grass.

Hey Grown-Ups!

- Make sure that the repellent you're using contains 20% or more of the active ingredient (like DEET).
- Help younger kids apply repellent and keep it away from eyes, mouth and hands.




- Wear repellent

how to Ramova a tick

- 1. Use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin's surface as possible.
- 2. Pull upward with steady, even pressure to remove the tick.

 Avoid twisting or jerking.
- 3. Clean the bite area and your hands with rubbing alcohol, iodine scrub, or soap and water.

Notes:

- Remove the tick as soon as possible.
- If tick mouth parts remain in the skin, leave them alone. In most cases, they will fall out in a few days.
- Don't use nail polish, petroleum jelly, or a hot match to make the tick detach.
- If you develop a rash or fever within several weeks of removing a tick, see your doctor. Be sure to tell the doctor about your recent tick bite, when the bite occurred, and where you most likely acquired the tick.
