CAPITAL PROJECT UPDATES

I wanted to provide you with an update on the previously approved project. The previously approved project was split into two phases to ensure that the construction timeline would be efficiently managed with available building aid from the State.

As with any school facility improvement, there are many steps that go into getting the required approvals from the NYS Education Department. The process includes:

- 1. Voter approval.
- 2. Identification of project specifics including detailing aspects of the work that fit into the total budget.
- 3. Close work with architects and project management to both price and design the project.
- 4. Submission of the project to the State Education Department for permits and approvals.
- 5. Bidding and securing of contractors for the project.

Following these steps, the project can then move into the purchasing and construction phase. Below is an overview of the project and an update for each building.

It is important to know that this larger project was broken down into smaller phases. This was done to maximize the work that can be done within a reasonable timeframe while also keeping in mind that we are keeping the project at a \$0 tax impact. This was one of the strong considerations in working to phase out the project.

Update: We have been working closely with the architects to redesign the main office and nurse's office. These spaces have been designed with the input of the administrative team and nurse. At this time, initial renderings are in the process of being submitted for State Education Department approval. Once these are approved, the district can continue moving ahead with the renovation of these spaces.

Update: The turf has been approved by SED and is awaiting favorable weather for installation. Weather depending, our goal remains to have this completed for the spring sports season. Included in this is also the replacement of the cover of the long jump pit.

In addition to these projects, the district has also been

working through an emergency project to remediate a leak that occurred under the middle and high school building. This leak does not compromise student or staff health and safety but did require more immediate attention and repair.

Given that some of our work is just getting ready to begin, we will not be asking for the public to vote again in February 2025, as initially shared. Instead, we are working closely with the architects to create renderings of the improved spaces to present to the public for a vote later in the calendar year, likely November 2025. This vote will then include the remainder of the proposed work such as classroom renovations at the Primary School, science and music room renovations at the Intermediate School, creation of flexible learning spaces, classroom renovations and removal and installation of fuel tank at the Middle and High School. Approaching the second vote in this manner will allow us to ensure that the continuity of work is preserved.

Tips for Parents from the School Health Office

Many parents ask, "When is my child sick enough to stay home from school?"

This is not always an easy question to answer! We hope that these tips can help!

A child who is sick will not be able to perform well in school and is likely to spread the illness to other children and staff. We suggest planning for childcare ahead of time so you will not be caught without a comforting place for your child to stay if he/she is ill.

Our school procedures state that you should not send your child to school if he/she has:

- Fever in the past 24 hours
- Vomiting in the past 24 hours
- Diarrhea in the past 24 hours
- Chills
- Sore throat
- Strep Throat (must have been taking an antibiotic for at least 24 hours before returning to school)
- Pink eye (must have 24 hours of antibiotic eye drops before returning)
- Bad cold, with a very runny nose or bad cough, especially if it has kept the child awake at night.
- Head lice until your child has been treated according to the treatment instructions.

If your child becomes ill at school and the teacher or school nurse feel the child is too sick to benefit from school or is contagious to other children, you will be called to come and take him/her home from school. It is essential that your child's

teacher have a phone number where you can be contacted during the day and an emergency number in the event you cannot be reached. Please be sure that arrangements can be made to transport your child home from school and that childcare is available in case of illness. If your daytime or emergency phone number changes during the year, please notify your child's teacher immediately.

In Case of Bad Weather GCS Closing Policy

Adverse weather and/or road conditions may cause school closings or delays. Often, a two-hour delay for our buses will allow road crews enough time to sand or clear roads and provide a much safer transportation situation.

Parents should be advised that our bus drivers are instructed to not travel on any road that appears to be in hazardous conditions. Therefore, even when school is in session, isolated groups of students may not receive bus transportation. Parents are asked to please be extremely cautious when having students exposed to the cold or wind for lengthy periods of time. In the event of a breakdown or an emergency students must be dressed appropriately. Some examples include coats, boots, and gloves. Finally, please have students stand away from the road while waiting for the bus for their safety and the safety of those already on the bus.

In addition to or automated call system, announcements on closures or delays will be posted on our school's web page, our GCS App, WBNG, and the district's Facebook page. The GCS app is free to download, search for Greene Central School district in your app store. Please check these first, as some media outlets no longer accept closings and delays because most districts utilize their own call system and web page.

In the Event of a Delay

- A. BOCES Occupational Education students—In the event of two-hour delay in opening, morning BOCES students will not be sent to the area center. They will stay at the High School campus.
- B. Students attending any special class or parochial school will be transported to their respective schools, but with a two-hour delay in arrival time.

It is important to continue to watch and listen for updates!

Early Dismissals

In the event of a forecast that indicates approaching weather that may cause hazardous driving conditions, we may have an early dismissal. In this event, notifications are made using:

- · Automated calling system
- · School app
- District Facebook page
- District website
- WBNG 12 News

We urge parents to alert caregivers of this possibility to ensure that younger children are not left at home unsupervised; someone must be present to receive young children. Parents of elementary children, please contact the school secretary or transportation department at your earliest convenience with babysitter information, so that students are loaded properly on their bus.
