Superintendent's Message

I am pleased to welcome you back to school as we begin the 2023-2024 school year. I sincerely hope that our families and staff had opportunities to enjoy some quality family time and time to travel or relax with family and friends. I hope that this school year turns out to be everything you hoped for. I firmly believe that a quality education makes a significant difference in the quality of one's life. Whether our students plan to go on to college or take advantage of workforce opportunities, we, at Greene Central, are committed to providing the educational and training opportunities that will lay a great foundation for success in life.

I would like to remind our students and their parents that regular attendance and hard work are two important components of success in school. In my numerous years in education, I have seen very few students fail when they have worked hard and attended school regularly. This means that students should not miss more than one day a month. Students who miss more than two days per month put their education and academic success at risk. Imagine if you missed two days a month at work- or the equivalent of twenty-four days a year- you could easily put your job at risk. This is true of students who miss this amount of time. They could put their education at risk.

I encourage our students to take full advantage of the extracurricular and cocurricular opportunities we provide in the school and community. Students who participate in drama, art, music, clubs, athletics, and school service opportunities have a far better educational experience. They have more opportunities to create lasting friendships and develop important leadership skills, self-discipline, and collaboration skills to name a few. FRESHMEN/SOPHOMORES

- Join clubs and activities.
- Keep in contact with teachers, counselors, and activity advisors who you connect with. They can write letters of recommendation later.
- Talk about saving for college with your family.
- Volunteer—it's a great experience!
- Begin to think about a college choice. Remember that you have time to explore what you want in a college.
- · Challenge yourself with difficult courses.

JUNIORS

- Explore financial aid options and college planning with your family.
- Take the most challenging courses you can. Admission offices look for challenging coursework.
- · Research and visit prospective colleges.
- Continue to stay active in clubs, activities, and volunteer work.
- Determine from what teachers, counselors, or advisors might you want a recommendation?
- · Keep track of your activities and accomplishments for your resume.
- Sign up for the PSAT, which will help prepare you for college entrance exams, like the SAT.

SENIORS

- Visit websites and social media of potential colleges and universities. You will find applications and other important information on their sites.
- Request applications and brochures from your target colleges/ universities.
- Attend college fairs and speak to campus representatives. Remember to check in the Guidance Office for the many different colleges that come to Greene High School!
- Take the SAT and/or ACT in the fall, again or if you haven't already.
- Schedule interviews with prospective colleges. Practice your interview skills before heading to the actual interview.
- Continue to visit any prospective colleges.
- Take college or advanced classes. Challenging courses show that you may be more prepared for challenging college coursework.
- Set up a budget for college and application costs.
- Attend the Financial Aid Night offered from Guidance in the fall with your parents.
- Get your applications in order by creating files for target schools. Make a list of application requirements (essays, transcripts, recommendations, etc.) and deadlines for each.
- Request letters of recommendation from teachers, counselors, coaches, and employers at least three weeks before you need them. Provide them with a resume.
- Work on college application essays.
- Look for part-time jobs, internships, and volunteer work.

Our annual Financial Aid Night for seniors and their parents will again be offered this fall. A letter will be sent home with more information. It's never too early to go to *www.fafsa.ed.gov* and create your FSA ID. FAFSA will open for the 2023-2024 school year in October.

Our administrative team has been working diligently over the summer putting together exciting plans for the upcoming school year. For 2023-2024, our schools will be focused on three key goals to continue to help every student find success in school:

- 1. Creating and implementing cognitively engaging curriculum and instruction that promotes equity for each and every student at GCS.
- 2. Improving literacy and writing across all grade levels and all curricular areas.
- 3. Re-designing our Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) model to be much more beneficial to student learning.

To set the tone for the school year, on opening day for all staff, we will have author, Eric Sheninger, deliver our keynote. Mr. Sheninger has written many books on instructional technology and education in general. His latest book, *Disruptive Thinking in Our Classrooms: Preparing Learners for Their Future*, will be the focus on his talk. Our world has been changing fast and education has not kept pace across the country. Here in Greene, we have the opportunity and the potential to become an innovative blue-ribbon school if we are open to challenging the status quo, thinking outside of the box, and working together (while supporting each other) to shift practices and mindsets. Together we can accomplish anything as long as we are willing. There will be bumps along the way, but when we hit those bumps, we just need to help each other up, brush it off, and keep going.

You might be wondering how we are going to accomplish these goals. Well, we spent last year figuring out the needs across the district and started strategically planning how to move forward. We have a lot of exciting things ready to start on in September which include the following:

Goal 1: Creating and implementing cognitively engaging curriculum and instruction that promotes equity for each and every student at GCS.

- All core content area teachers will be working on reviewing, updating, and or creating curriculum that embeds critical thinking, communication, collaboration, creativity, and other important skills students need for the future.
- In addition to the training on Staff Development Days in writing and literacy, teachers will be able to choose to engage in one or more book studies:
 - "Disruptive Thinking in Our Classrooms" by Eric Sheninger
 - "50 Strategies to Boost Cognitive Engagement" by Rebecca Stobaugh
 - "Unlocking English Language Learner's Potential" by Diane Staehr Fenner and Sydney Snyder
 - "Motivating Students Who Don't Care" by Allen N. Mendler

Goal 2: Improving literacy and writing across all grade levels and all curricular areas.

- Teachers in grades K-3 are engaging in training for the foundations of early literacy to better be able to teach our youngest students how to read.
- Grades 3-8 will be implementing a writing program called Empowering Writers to help students build their skills (teachers will receive training in this and will also engage in calibration exercises throughout the school year).
- Grades 6-8 teachers will engage in training in literacy in the content areas.
- Grades PK-5 will engage in a process to continue to review new reading programs and then select the best program that will meet the needs of our students and then begin the process of reviewing our mathematics program.

Goal 3: Re-designing our Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) model to be much more beneficial to student learning.

• A team of teachers and administrators will be proactively working with a team from NYSED to uncover the challenges in our special education and academic intervention services, identify ways to address those challenges, and support the implementation of solutions.

This may be the most excited I have been for a new school year to begin that I have been for many years! I hope you are all ready to take GCS from being a good school to an extraordinarily phenomenal school district.

From the Athletic Office

The fall sports season begins on August 21 for all JV/Varsity sports. Modified practices will start on August 28. All athletes are required to have a sports physical completed by our school physician, Dr. Masarech. We completed sports physicals during school in June. We will offer another opportunity in August before practices start.

We are using Final Forms for all sports registrations. We switched to this platform in the spring as it offers more communication opportunities as well as organizational efficiencies within the athletic department. JV and Varsity registrations opened on July 21, 2023. Modified registrations opened on July 28, 2023. Aktivate, formerly Schedule Galaxy, is used for communicating game schedules. Both programs have apps available that can be downloaded on your mobile devices.

Greene will continue to provide an athletic trainer for 2023-2024. We are pleased to announce that Zach Spencer will be providing services again this year. We have also added Luke Dalberg from Lourdes as a part-time strength and conditioning coach.

The district will be providing streaming services for contests on our turf field and HS gymnasium. We added a HUDL camera to the Intermediate School gym to stream modified contests. We are working to set up procedures that will allow us to use HUDL Remote Truck to stream contests in the pool and on our grass fields. You will find information regarding streaming options for home and away games on our website's athletic page.

Modified athletes will continue to have a Winter I and Winter II season. Winter I will be girls' and boys' basketball. Winter II will be wrestling and girls' volleyball. This format will allow students to participate in two modified sports for the winter season.

We encourage all students to come out and be part of our athletic program. Our fall offerings are listed below: Boys: Football, Golf, Soccer; Girls: Field Hockey, Soccer, Swimming, Volleyball. We have two new offerings for athletes this season. We will offer indoor track in the winter as a merged sport with Oxford. We will also offer girls' flag football in the spring.

We anticipate coaching vacancies this year. Please check the athletic page throughout the year regarding vacancies and coaching requirements.

How to Succeed in Middle School

The middle school years are exciting and full of change! As a learner, students are moving from being dependent upon teachers and parents to help them manage their academics to becoming independent learners as they enter high school. Our goal at the middle school is to give students the tools and resources that they need in order to successfully navigate these years. Parents, work with your child to ensure that he or she is using these tried and true tips to succeed in middle school.

Tip 1: Set up a system to remember and organize assignments

- Use your academic planner daily in class to write down assignments when they are given.
 - For long-term assignments, write the assignment down on the day that it was assigned as well as on the day that it is due. Then set mini goals for yourself and record those in your agenda to help keep you on track.
 - Use your agenda to keep track of even/odd days. Write down any other important information (for example, reminders to bring PE clothes or other materials to school, important events such as dances, school events, or holidays).
- Place a white board in your locker. Use this for important reminders. Keep one at home, too!
- Check your agenda and Google classroom to make sure all assignments are completed.
- Check your grades using School Tool at least once a week. This will help you double check to make sure that you are staying on track and that you are meeting your academic goals.
- If you are absent from school, talk to your teachers right away to find out what you missed. Stay with teachers 9th period to learn missed material so you do not fall behind.

Tip 2: Create an organized, quiet and calm space to learn (in school and at home)

- Clean out your locker weekly. Bring home extra "stuff" that may have accumulated throughout the week. Place any loose papers in the appropriate folders and throw away anything that is not needed.
- Look through materials in your folders and binders at least once or twice a month, or at the end of each class unit. Have a place at home to store important assignments (for example, past exams) that you will need to keep in order to study for final exams.
- Have a quiet spot at home to complete your work, and avoid watching TV or begin online while you are doing your homework. Create a routine for yourself and make sure to schedule time to study and do your homework.

Tip 3: Communicate, Communicate!

- Kids: If you are struggling in school—if you do not understand your assignment, are having a difficult time working with classmates, or think that you missed important information, ask your teachers! They are here to help.
- Parents: If your child is struggling, do not wait to reach out to his or her teacher/teachers. Email teachers directly, or set up a parent conference to meet with the entire team so that we can work together to find a solution.
- Kids and Parents: Keep communicating with each other in general about what is going on in your life. Talk about the good and the bad! Kids, if you are having a difficult time with other people at school, let your parents know, and talk to your teachers, principal or school counselors about it. Parents, if your child expresses concerns to you, make sure to communicate those concerns with us so that we can help.
- If you have not already done so, visit the Greene Middle School website. Search the main page, counselor page, and teacher pages and refer back to them throughout the year for important dates and information on what your child is learning in school.

Tip 4: Have fun, and take care of yourself!

- Middle schoolers experience significant physical and emotional changes over a very short period of time. They learn a lot about themselves—they develop new interests, discover new strengths, and explore future possibilities. Emotional ups and downs happen. Friends change, and hearts get broken. This is the time to start learning how to manage all of those changes.
- Parents: Help your child find healthy ways to express their emotions. Discover positive outlets for anger, sadness, and frustration so that it does not become overwhelming. Teach your child(ren) to use problem solving skills to work through difficult academic and social situations.
- Students: pay attention to how you are feeling, and to how your body, mind, and interests are changing. Try out new activities in and outside of school to discover new interests. Be aware of the social struggles that might come up, and remember to treat friends the same way you would want to be treated, even if you are upset. Work to solve conflicts in healthy, positive ways by talking calmly directly to the person who is upsetting you. If you need help, reach out to your parents, the school counselor, or a trusted teacher.

Middle school can sometimes feel like a roller coaster. It's a fun ride, but there might be ups and downs along the way. Everyone's experience is different, but in the end, our hope is that you leave us in the 8th grade ready and confident for high school.

Child Find Requirements

Child Find is the process of locating, evaluating, and identifying students with disabilities who are in need of special education services, from birth to 21 years old. According to federal special education law, IDEA 2004, this includes all students, including those who are homeless, wards of the State, or attending private schools, regardless of the severity of their disabilities.

If you have a child with a suspected disability, age birth to 3 years old, we encourage you to contact the Early Intervention Program at the Chenango County Health Department. Call 607-337-1729 at the Chenango County Office Building, 5 Court Street, Norwich, New York 13815. For children ages 3 to 5, you may contact the Committe e on Preschool Special Education, at Greene Central School, 607-656-4161, extension 3803, or the Chenango County Representative on Preschool Special Education, also at the Chenango County Health Department, at 607-337-1731.

If you have a child with a suspected disability between the ages of 5 through 21, please contact your child's teacher at Greene Central School. We are now required to try a number of academic or behavioral interventions when a student has a suspected disability. If the student is not responding after an appropriate period of time to the interventions, then the student's teacher will refer the student to the Child Study Team, or the Grade Level Team, and additional interventions will be suggested and documented. It is at that time that a student may be referred to the Committee on Special Education.

When a student is referred to the Committee on Special Education for a suspected disability, they are given an individual evaluation to identify the need for special education services. A student is eligible for special education services if it is determined that he/she has a disability that is interfering with the student's learning. If the Committee on Special Education determines that your child is eligible for special education services, the Committee must identify the one disability category that most appropriately describes your child.

A school-aged student will qualify for special education services when they have one or more of the following disabilities, which adversely affects educational performance: Autism, Deafness, Deaf-Blindness, Emotional Disturbance, Hearing Impairment, Learning Disability, Intellectually Disabled, Multiple Disabilities, Orthopedic Impairment, Other Health-Impairment, Speech or Language Impairment, Traumatic Brain Injury, or Visual Impairment.

The Committee on Special Education will develop and implement an individualized education program (IEP) to address your child's individual needs. Services, such as integrated co-teaching, consultant teacher, or resource room may be provided. Related services, such as speech/language therapy, occupational therapy, physical therapy, or counseling may also be provided. Your child may need classroom or testing accommodations to help him or her successfully access the general education curriculum.

Cafeteria News

We are pleased to inform you that Greene Central Schools will be participating in the Community Eligibility Provision available to schools participating in the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs for the 2023-2024 school year.

All students enrolled at Greene Central School are eligible to receive a healthy breakfast and lunch at school at no charge to your household each day of the 2023-2024 school year. Your child(ren) will be able to participate in these meal programs without having to pay a fee or submit a free and reduced application.

Only one breakfast and one lunch are available at no charge. Extras, snacks, ala carte items and milk (purchased separate from a meal) will have to be purchased. Make sure you join us for breakfast and lunch!

A CEP application is included in our newsletter and available online. We encourage each family to still complete and return applications as soon as possible for other funding options available to our school.

Pesticide Information

New York State Education Law Section 409-H, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

As a reminder, the Greene Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior notification of certain pesticide applications. The following applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- a school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following application;
- anti-microbial products;
- nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-use pastes, foams, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- the application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- the application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25;
- the use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps, and hornets.

In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list

Early Dismissal Drill October 13

As you may be aware, all school districts in New York State must comply with the Commissioner of Education's Regulation 155.13, which requires written annual instructions to parents, students, and staff regarding district emergency management plans. The complete plans are on file and available in the District Office and in each principal's office.

The object of emergency planning is to anticipate problems in dealing with natural and man-made disasters. Depending on the kind and intensity of the disaster, the school may be required to carry out any of the following procedures:

- 1. School Cancellation
- 2. Evacuation
- 3. Early Dismissal
- 4. Sheltering

Sheltering and early dismissal drills are held at least once a year. The Greene Central School District has scheduled its annual test of the early dismissal plan for **Friday**, **October 13**, **2023**. Students will be released 15 minutes earlier than the normally scheduled time. The students at BOCES programs and other programs off-site will be released even earlier so that all students will leave the high school parking lot at approximately 2:15 p.m.

In the event of a real emergency, procedures may be carried out without advanced notice. Children may be coming home to empty homes or locked doors. Parents should make contingency plans with their children in the event of an emergency, especially if the children require supervision. Please make appropriate arrangements for the early arrival of your children as a result of this drill. If you have any questions, you may contact your child's building principal or the Transportation Department at 607-656-4161, ext. 4802.

Student Accident Insurance

Greene Central School is one of twelve schools participating in the Delaware-Chenango-Madison-Otsego BOCES sponsored accident insurance program. It is underwritten by the Insurance Company of North America, a division of CIGNA, and is administered by the Allen J. Flood Companies, Inc.

The 2023-2024 program covers your child for all school sponsored and supervised activities, including travel directly to and from such activities. When accident medical expense is incurred as a result of a school activity, you will be reimbursed on a reasonable and customary basis up to the policy limit of \$15,000. It is important that you familiarize yourself with the coverage, benefits and limits your district's plan provides. Benefits are paid in excess of your child's primary insurance plan.

Policy # 53—The Dignity for All Students Act—Cyberbullying

The Board is committed to providing a school environment that is free from harassment, bullying and discrimination. Harassment, discrimination, intimidation or bullying and acts of cyberbullying, as defined by New York Education Law Article Two and the Regulations of the Commissioner § 100.2 by students, staff or visitors toward students are strictly prohibited. Therefore, in accordance with such laws and regulations, conduct of this nature is subject to discipline in accordance with the District's Code of Conduct and the Internet Safety and Acceptable Use Policies.

Reports of harassment, bullying and discrimination shall be made to the Building Principal***, Superintendent or the Principal's or Superintendent's designee. Students and parents/guardians may make an oral or written report of harassment, bullying or discrimination to District teachers or administrators.

District employees who witness harassment, bullying or discrimination, or who receive an oral or written report of harassment, bullying or discrimination, shall promptly orally notify the Building Principal, Superintendent or the Principal's or Superintendent's designee not later than one school day after such employee witnesses or receives a report of harassment, bullying or discrimination. After oral notification, the District employee shall file a written report with the Building Principal, Superintendent or the Principal's or Superintendent's designee not later than two school days after making the oral report.

The Building Principal, Superintendent or the Principal's or Superintendent's designee shall lead or supervise a thorough investigation of all reports of harassment, bullying or discrimination, and ensure that said investigation is completed promptly after receipt of any written reports made.

In the event an investigation verifies harassment, bullying or discrimination, the District shall take prompt actions reasonably calculated to end the harassment, bullying or discrimination, eliminate any hostile environment, create a more positive school culture and climate, prevent recurrence of the behavior, and ensure the safety of the student or students against whom such harassment, bullying or discrimination was directed. Retaliation against any individual who, in good faith, reports or assists in the investigation of harassment, bullying or discrimination, is strictly prohibited.

Individuals whose behavior is found to be in violation of this policy will be subject to discipline or removal from the premises in accordance with school policy, including the Code of Conduct. If appropriate, individuals may also be referred to law enforcement officials.

The Building Principal shall make a regular report on data and trends related to harassment, bullying and discrimination to the Superintendent.

The Superintendent shall establish procedures and guidelines that will include, but not be limited to, staff training and professional development, the method of reporting an incident believed to be in violation of this policy, the procedure for investigation and the prohibition of retaliation for reporting an incident. The District shall also provide required instruction supporting development of a school environment free of harassment, bullying and discrimination having an emphasis on discouraging acts of harassment, bullying (including cyberbullying) and discrimination and including instruction in the safe, responsible use of the Internet and electronic communications.

The Board will review this policy from time to time, but no less than annually, and will make any necessary modifications as required by the applicable laws and regulations. This policy and any amendments or addendums shall be published in the student handbook and on the District website. At least once each school year, the District shall provide all school employees, students and parents or persons in parental relation with a written or electronic copy of this policy and any other policy created by the District in compliance with the Dignity for All Students Act.

If the Superintendent or Principal designates a staff member to receive oral or written reports of harassment, bullying, or discrimination, then the Superintendent or Principal shall publish the name and title of the designee to the school community as an addendum to this policy.

Parents' Bill of Rights for Data Privacy and Security

In accordance with Education Law Section 2-d, the Greene Central School District hereby sets forth the following Parents' Bill of Rights for Data Privacy and Security, which is applicable to all students and their parents/legal guardians.

- 1. A student's personally identifiable information cannot be sold or released for any commercial purposes;
- In accordance with FERPA, Section 2-d and Board Policy 7640 Student Records; Access and Challenge, parents have the right to inspect and review the complete contents of their child's education record;
- 3. The District has the following safeguards in place to protect student data, including personally identifiable information stored or transferred by the District:
 - a) All databases that have student information are protected by a secure password and login. These logins are monitored and kept up to date.
 - b)Student information is only accessible by those that are deemed warranted of having the information.
- 4. The New York State Education Department collects a number of student data elements for authorized uses. A complete list of all student data elements collected by the State is available for public review from the State Education Department. Websites and mailing addresses will be made public when they become available.
- 5. Parents have the right to submit complaints about possible breaches of student data or teacher or principal APPR data. Any such complaint must be submitted in writing to:

Annual Notification

NOTICE TO PARENTS AND ELIGIBLE STUDENTS OF RIGHTS UNDER THE FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT.

To: Parents and Eligible Students of Greene Central School District

You are notified that you have the following rights in relation to student records:

- 1. The right to inspect and review a student's education records.
- 2. The school district shall limit the disclosure of information contained in the student's education records except: (a) by prior written consent of the student's parents or an eligible student, (b) directory information, or (c) under certain limited circumstances, as permitted by FERPA.
- 3. The right of a student's parents or an eligible student to seek to correct parts of the student's education records which he or she believes to be inaccurate, misleading or in violation of the student's rights. These rights include the right to a hearing to present evidence that the records should be changed if the district decides not to alter it according to the parents' or an eligible student's request.
- 4. The right of any person to file a complaint with the Department of Education if the school district violates FERPA.
- 5. If either a student's parents or an eligible student desires to obtain copies of the policy pertaining to student records, notification should be presented to the appropriate Building Principal, Greene Central School District, Greene, NY 13778.

You are further advised that you have the following rights:

- 1. The right to exercise a limited control over other people's access to the student's education records;
- 2. The right to seek and correct the student's education records, in a hearing if necessary;
- 3. The right to report violations of the FERPA to the Department of Education; and
- 4. The right to be informed about FERPA rights.

All rights and protections given to parents under the FERPA and this policy transfer to the student when he or she reaches age 18 or enrolls in a post secondary school. The student then becomes an "eligible student".

DIRECTORY INFORMATION

The school district proposes to designate the following personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records as "directory information", and it will disclose that information without prior written consent:

1. The student's name;

- 2. The name of the student's parents;
- 3. The student's address;
- 4. The student's telephone number;
- 5. The student's date of birth;

- 6. The student's class designation (e.g., first grade, tenth grade, and the like);
- 7. The student's extracurricular participation;
- 8. The student's achievement awards or honors;
- 9. The student's weight and height, if a member of an athletic team;
- 10. The student's photograph; and
- 11. The school or school district the student attended before he or she enrolled in the school district.

You have two weeks to advise the school district, in writing, directed to the office of the school superintendent, of any and all items which you refuse to permit the district to designate as directory information about the student.
